A Message from Our Club President

Well, we've made it to February. Not my favorite month of the year. But it does have some good aspects. One, It's the shortest month of the year. And two, it's not January. It's also a month we celebrate an American icon. His name invokes feelings of hope for a better day. Yes, I'm talking about Punxsutawney Phil.

Since I have nothing else to talk about this month, I thought I would share some interesting facts about Groundhog Day, Phil and groundhogs in general.

- The first Groundhog Day in Punxsutawney was held in 1886 and has been held each year since then.
- Approximately 40,000 people attend the Groundhog Day celebration in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania each February 2nd.
- Punxsutawney Phil's weather predictions have been accurate approximately 39% of the time since 1887. He sees his shadow about 85% of the time.
- Other names for groundhogs include woodchucks, whistle-pigs and landbeavers.
- Groundhogs are members of the squirrel family and are the largest of all marmots. They can climb trees and swim very well.
- Average Size: 20" long with 6-7" tail, 6-12 lbs.
- Average Lifespan in the Wild: 3-6 years
- According to legend, If the groundhog sees a shadow, then it goes back into its burrow and winter will last 6 more weeks.
- Groundhogs are among the few animals that are true hibernators,

fattening up in the warm seasons and snoozing for most of three months during the chill times.

- To accommodate its bodacious appetite, woodchucks grow upper and lower incisors that can withstand wear and tear because they grow about a sixteenth of an inch each week.
- While hibernating, a woodchuck's body temperature can drop from about 99 degrees to as low as 37 (Humans go into mild hypothermia when their body temperature drops a mere 3 degrees, lose consciousness at 82 degrees and face death below 70 degrees).
- The heart rate of a hibernating woodchuck slows from about 80 beats per minute to 5.



So, armed with these facts, one has to ask, why would anyone, in their right mind, grab a sleeping, 12 pound "rodent" with large incisors and long claws and pull him out of his burrow, into the cold, during the early morning hours? There's really only one logical answer to this question. People love a good party.

According to Phil, we can expect another 6 weeks of winter. The Old Farmer's Almanac predicts a warmer than normal March and April, but May will be cooler than normal. Time will tell who is right. But by then we'll be riding again and won't care.




